

Watching Ospreys – Activity Sheet

Introduction

Watching Ospreys not only is enjoyable to us, but also helps with our knowledge and understanding of their behaviour, which is really important in knowing how best to help protect them through our conservation work.

At the Rutland Osprey Project, we have a fantastic team of volunteers who spend their time monitoring one of the breeding pairs of Ospreys at the Lyndon Visitor Centre & Nature Reserve. They note down key details for us including which species of fish is brought back to the nest, the length of time an adult is incubating the eggs and also watching for any signs of intruders, which could be another Osprey coming to have a look at the nest.
